MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Don't miss **UpCycle.17 on display through November 24 in Hilo at the East Hawai'i Cultural Center/Museum of Contemporary Art.**

This annual exhibition, formerly known as the Hawai'i Island Artists Trash Show, has been running for nearly 30 years. Recycle Hawai'i (RH) has been a regular Patron of this event with \$100 donated for the special RH designated award and listing on the "Tutu Hana Hou Award" plaque, in remembrance of the late Joann Diotalevi, former North Hawai'i Community Educator for Recycle Hawai'i.

Grant Funding

CAPture Bottle Cap Reclamation Project, funded by a grant from The Atherton Family Foundation, is wrapping up this year thanks to Education Director, Marsha Hee. Dr. Neil Scott of The Makery, on the corner of Keawe and Kalakaua Streets in Hilo, serves as technical/engineering partner working with secondary level students and teachers at Connections Public Charter School to manufacture a student designed mold for producing a 3D object made from ground up plastic bottle caps. Project participants are preparing for their culminating display and demonstration at The Makery on First Friday, Dec. 1 at 3:00-5:00 pm. Save the date and join us for this family community event to learn more about this student initiated project to reuse and upcycle resources.

Mahalo to the Swain Barber Foundation based in Los Angeles, California for awarding a \$20,000 gift coming in January 2018 to continue our recycling and sustainability efforts for the current fiscal year. RH is awaiting word regarding our application to the Hawai'i Community Foundation FLEX grant program to be announced sometime in November 2017.

Reuse Centers (RC)

In addition to continuing break-ins and theft since opening in June, the Hilo store experienced serious flooding from storm of 10/23-24 – significant damage to donations. Kona and Keauhou sites were also unable to remain open due to flooding on 10/24. We will have to install additional 20'x40' tent/tarps to keep donations dry at the Hilo site. Due to previous sun and windstorm damage, we need to replace the 20'X30' tarp and poles at the Waimea site at a cost of approximately \$1,200 - \$1,500.

RH has been partnering with Honolulu-based contractors such as Nan, Inc., and Reuse Hawai'i in salvaging lumber, fixtures and other materials for resale at our Reuse Centers. Usable C&D materials reclaimed from construction sites are tracked by weight. We have a tare weight of our truck and trailer (empty) and when fully loaded the truck and/or trailer is taken to a certified weigh station and issued a weight ticket. This documentations is particularly useful for construction projects that are attempting to obtain LEED (Leadership in Engineering and Environmental Design) certifications in establishing proof of recycling and reuse pursuant to the qualifications for various levels of LEED certifications. Nan, Inc. has agreed to reimburse RH for weighing costs and fuel. The materials that are sold are also recorded by weight and made a part of the monthly diversion reports to COH-DEM (County of Hawai'i – Department of Environmental Management).

Latex Paint Diversion: Adjunct to COH-DEM Hilo/Kona/Waimea HHW, the next latex paint collection will be at Hilo transfer station's Reuse Center on Sat. Dec. 2, and Sat. Dec. 9 at the Kealakehe transfer station in Kailua-Kona, both events held from 7:30 a.m. – 2:30 p.m. Usable latex paint will be made available at the low price of \$5/gallon at the Kea'au Reuse/Recycling Center.

Puna Kamali'i Flowers (PKF), our subcontractor and partner for the past 14 years in successful diversion efforts at the Kea'au and Pāhoa Reuse Centers, will soon be installing a collection bin for clean newspaper to be shredded at the Hilo Reuse Center for reusing as packaging materials for their floral agricultural products.

Other Notes

Vicki Haili, RH Admin. Assistant, attended the annual Keep the Hawaiian Islands Beautiful (KHIB) Laulima Leadership Conference in Honolulu on October 13, 2017 representing RH and Keep Hawai'i Beautiful, the local affiliate of Keep America Beautiful. RH continues its collaborative efforts with these local and statewide organizations.

1st Quarter Completed Events

The 24th Annual Kokua i Na Kula (Help the Schools) program promoted by KTA Super Stores and other corporate sponsors ran from August 9 through September 19, 2017. This was our fourth year to partner with KTA Super Stores and Becker Communications to provide a resource awareness community service option where schools earn bonus points towards their share of \$100,000 for school improvements and learning materials. This year's results were the best yet. Students and teachers from eight schools turned in over 13,400 pieces of mylar snack bags, granola bar wrappers and aluminum juice pouches. These materials, which are not acceptable for recycling onisland, were diverted from the landfill by being shipped in (10) large boxes to TerraCycle, Inc. in New Jersey for upcycling and recycling. The shipping expense was reimbursed by Becker Communications.
